The war in the South Pacific in its entirety has remained remarkably neglected by historians. On Day 9 of the Battle of the Bulge, 2nd Lt. Donald N Evans was shot down behind enemy lines. Defying odds, he survived bailing out of his P-47 fighter plane seconds before it crashed. He limped and crawled through the snow-covered Ardennes Forest until after dark, trying to find a way back to the American front lines. When World War II began, New Mexico had a population of 531,815 inhabitants, one of the least populated of the 48 states.
