The predicate describes the subject, what the subject is doing, or what is being done to it. In Example 1, the subject is “The bird” and the predicate is “flew”.

A complex sentence contains a subordinate clause and an independent clause. A subordinate clause is a group of words that has a subject and a verb but does not express a complete thought. Here's a sentence diagram of a complex sentence. Note that there are still two horizontal lines, but one of them is below the other and moved to the right.

Sentence adverbs (like perhaps, surely, indeed, naturally, also....) relate to a whole clause or sentence, not just a single word. In most cases, they stand outside the clause they refer to, notably at the start of the clause. However, they may be placed elsewhere in the clause for reasons of stress or emphasis.

Compound sentences follow the same structure but do it twice. A compound sentence is one made of two clauses (sections). In this case, the sentence uses a conjunction to join two halves of the sentence, each of which has the same structure. I cooked dinner and my father bought some drinks.

Basic word order is subject, verb, object, like in English. "I drink water" = Ich trinke Wasser. When there's a modal verb like "want to", "try to", etc., the other verb gets shunted to the end. "I want to drink water" = Ich will Wasser trinken. In "subordinate clauses", the verb also gets

shunted to end. So “I drink water” is ich trinke Wasser but “I think that I drink water” is ich denke, dass ich Wasser trinke.

Every word in a sentence serves a specific purpose within the structure of that particular sentence. According to rules of grammar, sentence structure can sometimes be quite complicated. For the sake of simplicity, however, the basic parts of a sentence are discussed here. The two most basic parts of a sentence are the subject and predicate.

Complex Sentence Structure A complex sentence consists of an independent clause plus a dependent clause. (A dependent clause starts with a subordinating conjunction or a relative pronoun, and contains a subject and verb, but does not express a complete thought.)
